# <u>Tuesday – 5 April 2022</u>

## 14.00 | Departure from the LREXPO location (MoHo, Caen)

After the LREXPO on April 5, lunch will be offered in the location. Participants of the site visits will then depart from the MoHo towards the Normandy American Cemetery.

## 15.00 – 16.00 | Visit of the Normandy American Cemetery

The impressive American Military Cemetery of Collevillesur-Mer contains the remains of 9387 American soldiers who fell during the Battle of Normandy. The cemetery reflects and honours the sacrifices that the USA made for the liberation of Europe. From this point, one can overlook Omaha Beach, the deadliest landing beach of Operation Overlord.

## 16.45 – 17.15 | Visit to the Mulberry Harbour<u>in Arromanches-les-Bains</u>

While preparing for Operation Overlord, the Allied strategists decided to build two artificial, pre-fabricated ports in Normandy. These were considered essential for bringing reinforcements and equipment to the Continent. The remains of the port of Arromanches are still visible today as silent witnesses to this bold gamble and stunning technical achievement.

## 17.30 – 18:15 | Sunset at the <u>British Normandy Memorial</u> (Ver-sur-Mer)

The British Normandy Memorial records the names of the 22,442 servicemen and women under British command who fell on D-Day and during the Battle of Normandy in the summer of 1944. This includes people from more than 30 different countries. Inscribed in stone, their names have never, until now, been brought together. The site also includes a French Memorial, dedicated to the memory of French civilians who died during this time.

## 09:00 | Departure from Caen (MoHo)

## 10.30 – 11.30 | <u>Utah Beach Museum</u>

Built on the very beach where the first American troops landed on June 6, 1944, the Utah Beach Museum recounts the story of D-Day in 10 sequences, from the preparation of the landing to the outcome and success. This comprehensive chronological journey immerses visitors in the history of the landing through a rich collection of objects, vehicles (including an original B26 bomber), materials, and oral histories.

## 11.45 – 12.15 | Visit of Sainte-Mère-Eglise

The liberation of Europe from German occupation began in a spectacular fashion for the inhabitants of Sainte-Mère-Eglise. A misdrop brought paratroops raining down onto the village square, their chutes lit by the light of a house fire! Private John Steele would be the most famous of them all, left dangling from the pinnacle of the church tower.
